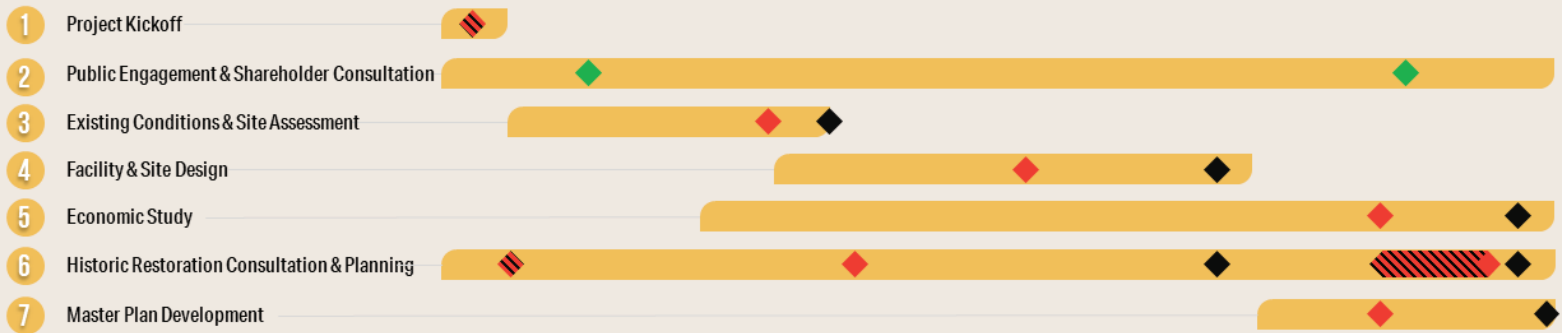
PILGRIM HOT SPRINGS

Pilgrim Hot Springs was purchased by Unaatuq, LLC in 2009. It had previously been owned by the Catholic Bishop of Northern Alaska. In the early 1900s, the site was a Catholic mission that included an orphanage for children who lost their families to the 1918 Spanish flu. Today, it is an important cultural and historic site as well as a relaxing, scenic getaway.
